# ADAPTATIONS OF PLANTS AND ANIMALS
























#### **NSWCHS CRICKET**

In Week 4 of Term 4, Harry Roscarel travelled to Sydney to participate in the NSWCHS Cricket Carnival which was played over four days at the Raby Sports Complex. Earlier in Term 3, Harry tried out for and was selected as part of the Western Region team for which he was elected captain. The Lachlan Access program had three students selected as part of the team, Harry from UCS, Blake Dillon from TCS and Ryan Goodsell from Condobolin HS.

On the first day, the boys played two T20 games. The first game was against Hunter and after a slow start with the bat Western posted a total of 116, of which Harry made 36 runs from 36 balls and was caught out in the second last over going for a big hit trying to move the score along. Hunter also had a slow start but then started to pile on the runs. They chased Western's total down with two overs to spare.

The second game was also a T20, this time against Sydney East. Harry won the toss and sent Sydney East in for a bat, which proved to be an excellent decision. Some sharp fielding saw the two opening batters out, with hardly a run between them, sent on their way with great throws resulting in direct hits to the stumps. Good all-round fielding saw the 20 overs done with a total of 7/118. In reply, Western lost an early wicket, and then set about chasing the total down. Harry and Cooper Giddings hit balls to all corners of the ground to make a partnership of 75, not out, Harry making 36 not out, from 30 balls. The boys won the game with two overs to spare, a direct reversal of the morning game.

On the second day, Western played Riverina in a 50 over game. Riverina won the toss and batted first, making a respectable 10/245. Harry had a bad day with the bat, chopping the ball onto the stumps very early on. However, some of the other boys stepped up with the bat and put on a fine batting display, smashing the ball around the ground to chase down the runs in the 42nd over, with only four wickets down.

The third day's games were played for placings. Western was in the semi-final, coming in at fourth place. Western played against Hunter again, who had placed first. Harry won the toss and sent Hunter in to bat. Hunter partook in a run fest and made 4/300 from the 50 overs. In reply, runs eluded everyone for Western and they were bowled out for 77 in the 26th over. This allowed the boys to go to the Golf simulator for the afternoon, where they all had a good time playing golf.

On Thursday, Western played off for 3rd and 4th spot against Sydney West. As everyone was playing a team of equal ranking, all the final days score were extremely low. Western batted first and were off to a very slow start before Harry came in and then he and Hugh Taylor put on a 68 run partnership before Hugh was run out, after batting beautifully. This upset the apple cart, as everyone to follow was not very successful with the bat. Harry played an excellent innings and was eventually LBW for 57. His wicket was taken by the leading wicket taker for the carnival, so no shame there. Western were bowled out for 136.

In the end, Western finished in 4th place, behind Hunter, South Coast and Sydney West. Harry had a good time while away, catching up with mates that he has played with, and against, in cricket further afield.

NSWCHS selected two teams to go to the All Schools carnival in February 2024 at Maitland. They will play against a team from the Catholic system, CCC, and the Independent Schools, CIS, to select a NSW team to complete later in the season. We congratulate Harry on his NSWCHS selection and wish him all the best in Maitland in 2024.

They each designed their favourite shoe and filled it with words that reflected their interests and personal stories.




